From the Chair

This is the last newsletter before the Outing. Cathleen and her committee of Saskatoon Camera Club are doing a great job of planning it, and the location is fabulous. The last time I was in Prince Albert National Park was on a college field trip in 1973 or 74, so it's been 50 years. There will be a whole new generation of trees for me to photograph!

A big change has been proposed for PRPA—to discontinue all print competitions and convert them to digital image. See the report on the Spring Board Meeting on page 11. This is something that should be decided by the membership, not just the Board, so it will be raised at the AGM in June. But not all members will be able to attend. To get your voice heard I will be sending out via email a survey questionnaire. Watch for it sometime in April.

The pros of switching to all digital include:

- Saving money on printing and mounting
- Saving on mailing of prints for members of clubs that are unable to send a representative to the Spring Board meeting
- Saving on mailing of prints back to members of clubs without any representation at the Outing
- Saving of more boxes of prints stored in the basement that our families will throw out after we're gone
- Procrastinators can prepare and send their entry the evening of the deadline
- Judging can be done remotely from home, as is done with the Hand of Man
- The Spring board meeting could be held by teleconference

The pros of continuing with prints:

- Some clubs are set up with good photo printers and a mat cutter so can easily, and for a reasonable cost, print and custom mat prints to enter the competitions
- Some clubs display prints in a public gallery or venue such as a hospital, so are doing prints anyway
- The print display at the Outing is a wonderful way to share your photography with other PRPA members, and to see what other photographers have done
- No special equipment is required to judge the prints, just a large room with a few tables or a smaller room with an easel
- Color and brightness do not change in prints depending on the equipment used to view them

The main purpose of PRPA, as I see it, is to meet, and fellowship with, photographers from other clubs across the prairie provinces. Competitions are one way to facilitate this, but there are hundreds of competitions on the internet so we don't need PRPA for that. I always enjoy finally meeting someone at an Outing whose photography I have been admiring for some time from their competition entries. It's fun to go on the Outing photo shoots with them too—that's when you really get to know them.

Speaking of the Outing, the Moose Jaw Camera Club is interested in hosting the 2025 PRPA Outing. They will decide in April and if it's a go will have a presentation at the Waskesiu Outing.

Looking forward to seeing you at Waskesiu in June.

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Competitions Report

We only have one year left in the list of themes for the Russell Competition so if you have any ideas for imaginative opposite themes, please let me know.

Image West ran into the problem of finding 11 x 14 photo paper this year and we subsequently had to purchase larger sheets and cut them down. We also had trouble finding the quality and quantity of paper we wanted, and the prices have increased substantially. The cost of having an 11 x 14 photo printed and mounted by a lab was close to \$25 each. If an individual or club must mail the entries in addition to printing and mounting the price could be prohibitive. members also felt they were getting a stockpile of prints accumulating they no longer have a use for other than gathering dust. It was the consensus at our last meeting that it be suggested that all PRPA present print competitions be changed to digital. I also talked to a club rep from a club that is no longer a member, that he was recommending to his club not to join because of the hassle of prints.

There are two competitions in the fall other than the Everest Club Competition that are open to all members of PRPA member clubs. The Hand of Man and The Gail Christensen Artistic Expressions Competitions. The only competition in the spring for club members that are not individual members is the Gerry Fish Club Competition. It has been suggested to move one of them to the spring and move a spring competition to the fall. If we were to do this, I suggest The Gail Christensen Artistic Expressions Com-

petition be moved to the spring because the Hand of Man Competition is a lot of work for the Competition Coordinator, and I think should stay as a fall competition.

The packages for the competitions have been emailed to the club reps for the competition their club is judging. If possible, get the results to me no later than the 22nd of April. This will allow me time to get digital copies of the winning prints to be included in the slideshow and have all the certificates printed in time for the Outing.

Thank you to all the club reps and members that judged competitions in the fall. A special thank you to two people that stepped forward and judged The Hand of Man after two judges had to withdraw from judging this year at the eleventh hour for personal reasons.

I have been the competition coordinator since the fall of 2018 and have really enjoyed it. However, this is my last year—it is time to pass the baton. Anyone that is interested in taking the position feel free to contact either me or Stan if you would like more information.

Russell Themes Needed

The list of themes generated at the 2006 Outing at Hitchcock's Hideaway is almost used up. There is just one more set remaining for 2025. Additional themes will need to be adopted by this time next year

The Russell competition is PRPA's longest running competition, started in 1958. Next year's themes will be the 68th set for this competition. We have the list from 2006 on, and the themes from a few years before that, but certainly not all of them.

Stan reported that the Rosetown Photography Club has 9 members this year. Our membership fee of \$100 doesn't quite cover the annual rent and insurance on our meeting room which totals \$1,392.

In Business Arising a motion was approved to bring to the AGM making the \$10 early-bird discount on the PRPA memberships permanent (every year). At the 2023 AGM it was just passed for that year.

A motion to convert print competitions to digital image was discussed with strong feelings expressed on both sides of the issue. The motion was tabled. Another motion was passed to send out a survey on this question to the membership prior to the AGM. Stan volunteered to do this.

An amendment to Bylaw 8.4 was approved to bring to the AGM that will allow PRPA to waive both an audit and review (both of which now require a professional accountant) and appoint two people to examine the financial accounts. A detailed copy of this amendment will be sent to everyone with the AGM agenda.

The following positions will need to be filled at the AGM: Secretary, Treasurer/Membership, and Competitions Coordinator. These are all important positions so please consider taking on one of them. If you won't be attending the AGM inform someone who will be of your interest.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:00 pm.

November 1, 1933 - March 6, 2024

Dorothy passed away peacefully on March 6, 2024 at age 90 at the Langham Care Home. She will be deeply missed and fondly remembered by her family and friends.

Dorothy was born November 1, 1933 in Leader, SK to Fred and Rose Priebe. She got her love of nursing from her mother and graduated from the U of S with a B.Sc. Nursing in 1956.

She married Donald Schmidt in 1956 and they raised six energetic and independent children together until she was widowed in 1980. Although this was a difficult time in her life, she continued with her interest in learning and went on to receive a Master of Continuing Education.

Dorothy's career included working as a nurse at St Paul's Hospital, an RCIA instructor at Holy Family Parish, and a Spiritual Director at the Queen's House Retreat & Renewal Centre until her retirement in 2001.

Dorothy and her second husband Paul Riemer were both members of the Saskatoon Camera Club where they met and began their court-ship. They were married in 2001. Dorothy and Paul were PRPA members from at least 2005 until Paul's death in 2012, and Dorothy continued until 2016 although she was no longer a very active participant. Her son-in-law Bob Ferguson is a current member of SCC.

One of her greatest joys was travelling the world with Paul and taking photos along the way of the animals in Africa, the ruins of ancient Rome, and the engineering marvel of the Panama Canal. Busy summers were spent at the Turtle Lake cabin gardening, birdwatching, playing cards, visiting family, and enjoying the sunsets. Her grandchildren will fondly remember her support, love, and her delicious cooking and baking.


May Dorothy rest in peace, knowing that she was loved and cherished by her family and friends. Her kind spirit will be carried in the hearts of those who knew her.









The <u>Central Alberta Photographic Society</u> ("CAPS") is based in Red Deer Alberta, and while most of our members call Red Deer home, we have a number of members that live in surrounding communities. As a group - there are about 90 of us - we are a very active bunch. Our experience level varies widely, from newcomers to professionals and points in between.

From September to November and January to April we meet on the second and fourth Wednesdays of the month on the Red Deer Polytechnic campus. Most often we'll have presenters from outside the organization - this year we were fortunate to have <u>Tony Wong</u>, <u>Chris Gibbs</u>, <u>Lewis Katz</u>, <u>Myrna Pearman</u>, <u>David DuChemin</u> and <u>Marc Koegel</u> speak to us.

Typically in the first meeting of the month we'll review the images from the current assignment. Topics vary widely and have included such things as Reflections, Motion Blur, Black & White, Street Photography, and more; afterwards, one of our Social Media volunteers will

Our members are often called upon to volunteer their talents for events in and around Central Alberta, such as the Winter Games and the Family Services Children's Festival. From time to time, our work is on display at the City Recreation Centre, the City Library, Red Deer Tourism, and select businesses.

Spring Board Meeting, March 23, Swift Current

The Board met at Houston Pizza in Swift Current Saturday March 23. After a delicious lunch we got down to business about 1:15.

Present were Stan Hingston, Ken Dumont, Shirley J. Gerlock, Marlene Andrew, Maureen Sinclair, Laird Wilson, Ed Fonger, Cathleen Mewis, Brenda Winny, and Diane McKinnon. Theresa Busse and Hilda Maier sent regrets.

The agenda was adopted as presented. The minutes from the Fall board meeting (held by Zoom in October) were adopted with no changes. It was noted that we did not have quorum at the Fall meeting so by adopting the minutes we were ratifying any decisions made.

The financial report shows a net profit to date (February 29) for this fiscal year of \$228. The Outing advance repayment and profit share from the Outing are still to come.

Shirley and Laird volunteered to examine the 2022-23 books before the AGM. This wasn't done last summer due to illness of the volunteers. Marlene needs another assistant to examine the 2023-24 books this coming summer.

A proposal by Theresa that instead of having two members examine the books, she prepare a detailed financial statement for the board to look over before passing it at the Fall board meeting. This would require a wording change in Bylaw 8.4 to make it optional. The conclusion of our discussion was that it is important to have someone examine the books, so it will remain as a requirement.

In his Chair report Stan welcomed the two new clubs—Lloydminster and Turner Valley—and two additional new reps—Hilda and Cathleen. With four new reps Marlene and Stan fielded many questions about the competition rules.

Shirley listed all the sympathy cards she has sent to PRPA members who recently lost a family member.

In her Membership report Theresa attached an up-to-date membership list showing 65 individual members and 6 member clubs. The fall campaign to contact past members who had not paid yet was successful in catching several who had forgotten to renew. She reminded members to please use the online form on the website—it's simple to use and automatically sends to Theresa. Payment can be made by check or e-transfer.

Stan's Newsletter report showed that 26 of the current 65 members requested paper copies of the Prairie Focus newsletter. Printing and mailing for the Winter issue came to \$179.

Scott reported that our new webhost Squarespace and using Smugmug for the galleries are a big improvement and worth the annual cost of \$234. The website is up to date—all changes sent to him have been made. The PRPA Facebook page has 226 followers.

In her SCC club report Cathleen informed us that there are just over 20 registered so far for the Outing. SCC has 89 members, some from out of the city as far as North Battleford. Cathleen raised the issue of judges' comments as being important in getting people to enter competitions.

In her Moose Jaw Camera Club report Hilda recommended all forms including judging forms be fillable and available on the website. She asked for more clarity in defining competitions such as Russell. She listed many of the club's activities such as presentations, outings and critique sessions. Moose Jaw club is considering hosting the 2025 Outing.
