From the Chair by Dan Sigouin

Happy 2022 to everyone in the PRPA family. It has been an interesting start to the new year, to say the least, and I sincerely hope everyone is healthy and looking forward to Spring. I began a comprehensive clean up process of my Lightroom Catalog. I was having memory issues with a hard drive and thought it would be a good idea to rip my library apart and reorganize it. Once I started opening folders, it was shocking to see the amount of culling and deleting necessary. I was shooting 7 shot bracketed shots consistently at almost every location, resulting in 8 image sets of everything. Since Darlene Hildebrandt's presentation on HDR technique, I have stopped shooting 7 shot brackets. In turn I have freed up hundreds of gigabytes of space on my hard drives. It feels good to have the space and the cleaning process was liberating. It also revealed a path of increased development in skill and technique with capturing and editing images. I hope the learning path continues forward and more great photos are in the future.

The Winter season has been dominated with work and duties with the Canadian Association for Photographic Arts. Likely everyone knows that I am the Zone Director for the Prairie Region. For this year, I created a gallery exhibition of the My Country – Canada competition in the month long Exposure Photo Festival in Alberta. This was a tremendous learning experience working with Exposure Fest, cSPACE King Edward, and CAPA. Twenty seven award winning images were selected from the competition and have been on display at cSPACE.

Through CAPA and the Foothills Camera Club, I also hosted the CAPA judging course. This was the first offering of the judging course in the prairies since 2019. It was a great day discussing judging techniques and viewing photos from the CAPA competition library.

The Saskatoon Camera Club has agreed to host a judging course on April 30. Details will be posted

on the CAPA website in the near future. If you are interested in learning about judging techniques for images, this is a great opportunity. CAPA is recognized as a world leader in judging standards. I took the judging course in 2017 to develop a better understanding of the judging process in order to improve my photography. It was a tremendous experience and totally changed my mindset of capturing images.

The Executive team is planning to meet, face to face, March 19 providing public health measures allow us to do so. This will be the first face to face meeting since the beginning of the pandemic.

I have been in contact with Tracy Lee, president of a new camera club in Saskatchewan, the Gravelbourg Camera Club, who expressed interest in joining PRPA. I have also reconnected with the Black Diamond club who are also considering joining.

Below is an image I entered in the CAPA lines and curves competition which received a 2nd place merit award. Very happy with the result on the image. The image is called "Iconic Structure"







Archives Report

In the mail today I received a very interesting Prairie Focus dated April 30, 1975. This is one I don't have in our collection. Jean Harris very kindly sent it to me for which I am truly grateful.

That year saw 328 members paying \$2.00 for membership. The 17 clubs listed, with number of members, are as follows:

Foothills (Calgary)	37
Cactus Club (S. Alberta)	9
High River	17
Waskasoo Club (Red Deer)	27
Gleneath (Kindersley)	12
Kindersley Camera Club	6
The Camera Club (Calgary)	22

Lacombe	5
Chinook (Claresholm)	34
Innisfail (Photo) Club	10
Calgary Camera Obscura	10

Note that of these 17 clubs, only Foothills and Gleneath are still active with PRPA today.

The Chairman listed for the Prairie Region of Photographic Arts was William C. Lovett.

It was noted that The Waskasoo Camera club was in charge of the Russell Trophy Competition for 1975-76 year. There were 33 entries with a total of 66 slides. The topic was Clean and Dirty. The Judges were Dennis Walker, Howard Northey and James Aellen, all from Waskasoo. Grant Klymyk of Innisfail Camera Club topped with 14 points, Don Fee of Innisfail Camera Club placed second with 13 points and Raye Phillispson of Medicine Hat Camera Club came in third with 12 points. Honorable Mentions went to W. T. Brown of Waskasoo Camera Club, Don Opp of Claresholm, and Elsie Hegerty of Gleneath Camera Club.

There was a long article pointing out the dos and don'ts of entering competitions, about the use of enlargers and special techniques, kind of paper, slide sets and that slides should be glass mounted.

It was noted that an Honorable Mention was given to Ken Jones and Kelly Prodanuk for their work in editing the Depth of Field bulletin which is an informative outlet belonging to the Regina Guild of Color Photography. President Clayton Howe was listed as their President. (It should be noted that the Regina Guild joined with The Regina Photo club in 1983, with some of their members still within the Club.)

The Red Deer President was Ernie McEachern who, along with Editor Peter Marryat, was working on their Club bulletin Viewfinder.

The Foothills Camera Club have launched headlong into their Winter Program with the Nature Competition, President's Trophy Competition and planned Outing to Photo Nut Haven. A slide set on Galapagos Island by Eva Hacket was been a highlight at the January 14th meeting.

Chinook Camera Club are busy with their Club Competitions with Hazel Hudson, Ellis Norgard, Don Opp and Shirley Clark participating. They are also providing judges for the Show and Tell competition for the Lethbridge Camera Club prior to their final banquet.

The Prairie Region of Photographic Art's Annual Regional Outing will be held in Calgary on June 11, 12 and 13th, 1976.

The De-Mystifying Filter by Keith Putt #10 – Noise Reduction

Noise has plagued electronic devices since Lee De Forest invented the triode vacuum tube in 1906. In this issue of the De-Mystifying Filter I discuss how noise affects photos in the digital era and what you can do about it.

Fundamentally, noise is rogue electrons drifting around your camera sensor and amplification circuits. There is no way to eliminate noise at the source. These constant background whispers compete with your photo for attention. Your photo (the signal) is usually loud enough to drown out the whispers (the noise). But not always.

Certain things accentuate noise:

- Any situation where you raise ISO or use long exposure to compensate for low light levels.
- Overheated sensor from environmental exposure or continuous use.
- Physically smaller sensor sizes (<u>not</u> lower pixel count sensors).

When the signal is high, as it is in well lit photos, noise is such a small component that you won't see it. When the signal is low, as it is in shadows and dark night skies, noise is more visible. Most of us rarely see enough noise to fret about it. To fanatics, though, any noise is fret-worthy.

Noise comes in two flavours. One is colour noise (colour speckles) and the other is luminance noise speckles (white-ish speckles). Colour noise is common in dark areas like shadow or night sky. Luminance noise adds roughness (graininess) that is most noticed in brighter areas. If noise gets bad enough, the whole photo begins to degrade. You don't want either of them, so which type you have (or you might have both) isn't important.

If you shoot Jpegs, the Jpeg generator adds a measure of noise reduction suitable for the type of photo you are taking. If you shoot RAW, noise reduction is your responsibility.

What suppression strategies are there? Check your camera menus. You might find noise reduction settings, particularly for long exposures. However, camera settings will never eliminate noise in all situations. Reducing the remainder requires photo editing software.

Any decent editing software will have noise reduction features. Many companies sell stand-alone or Photoshop plug-in software designed specifically for noise reduction. There is endless choice and I can't help you decide which is best nor how to use it. They all work by reducing the finest detail (noise is very fine detail) while retaining desirable fine detail (like strands of hair). So be judicious with the sliders. If you overdo noise reduction, you eventually start to throw out part of your photo.

Generally, make noise reduction one of your first edits. This is because other manipulations can exacerbate the situation. This is especially true of sharpening. Always make sharpening your last step.

In the real world, how serious is noise? Photographers not doing anything extreme (very high ISO, long exposures, night photos) are unlikely to see objectionable noise. If you only view photos on-screen, noise is not likely to be a concern. Prints, though, might suffer more.

People tend to examine prints at microscopic levels. Any warts are going to show. The larger the print, the more likely you will find something to complain about. Smooth areas look rough and shadows become speckled.

I use a basic, small-sensor digital camera and scanned film. Both these sources are known for above average noise. Yet I rarely do any noise reduction for photos that I don't print. When I do print, I pay full attention to noise reduction.




